PENNSYLVANIA STATE PARKS

OVERVIEW

In the heart of the Laurel Highlands at an altitude of 2,600 feet, Kooser State Park attracts visitors year-round to its 250 acres of forest and the beautiful trout stream that flows the full length of the park.

The park's original design character was stamped by the Civilian Conservation Corps projects of the 1930s that established the existing lake and most of its use areas, its architecture and site details. The park's basic appeal lies in its intimate areas which are most suited for family outings and small groups. Picnicking, fishing, swimming, camping, cross country skiing and family cabins are the major park uses.

OVERVIEW

Laurel Hill State Park consists of 4,072 acres of mountainous terrain in Somerset County. The 63 -acre Laurel Hill Lake is a focal point of the park. Laurel Hill is surrounded by thousands of acres of pristine state park and state forest lands. A trail system invites visitors to hike and explore the park and observe the diversity of plants and wildlife. Hemlock Trail passes through a beautiful stand of old growth hemlocks.

Laurel Ridge

PENNSYLVANIA STATE PARKS

OVERVIEW

The 13,625-acre Laurel Ridge State Park stretches along Laurel Mountain from the picturesque Youghiogheny River at Ohiopyle, to the Conemaugh Gorge near Johnstown. This large park spans Cambria, Fayette, Somerset and Westmoreland counties. The main feature of the park is the 70mile Laurel Highlands Hiking Trail, which provides the setting for a semiwilderness Backpacking and day hiking experience.

One of the most exciting reasons to visit the park is for its scenery. Spring wildflowers dot the forest floor in early April followed by a vibrant green forest as leaf-out begins in late April. Mountain laurel blooms in June and rhododendron blooms in late June and early July. Come to the park in mid-October and witness fall color in all its glory. Winter is spectacular when the park is covered in a deep blanket of snow and the occasional great horned owl calls through the moon-lit forest.

The varied topography and mixed hardwood and evergreen forest make the 612-acre Linn Run State Park a scenic place for picnicking, hiking and cabin rentals. Grove and Rock runs join to make Linn Run, an excellent trout stream that has a lovely waterfall, Adams Falls. Forbes State Forest borders Linn Run State Park and offers 50,000 acres of land for outdoor recreation.

Ohiopyle

PENNSYLVANIA STATE PARKS

OVERVIEW

Located at the southern reaches of the Laurel Ridge, Ohiopyle State Park encompasses approximately 20,500 acres of rugged natural beauty and serves as the southern gateway to the Laurel Highlands. Passing through the heart of the park, the rushing waters of the Youghiogheny [yaw-ki-gaynee] River Gorge are the centerpiece for Ohiopyle. The "Yough" [yawk] provides some of the best whitewater boating in the eastern United States, as well as spectacular scenery. Ohiopyle State Park is part of the protection and advocacy for this region by participating in the Laurel Highlands Conservation Landscape Initiative (CLI). This group is a partnership with landowners, community members, non-profit organizations and other stakeholders to protect the natural resources and bring community revitalization.

From the West: From the PA Turnpike, take Exit 91, Donegal. Turn left onto PA 31 east. Travel about two miles, turn right onto PA 711 and PA 381 south. Travel ten miles to Normalville, turn left onto PA 381 south for 11 miles to Ohiopyle.

From the East: From the PA Turnpike, take Exit 110, Somerset. Take PA 281 south 25 miles to Confluence. Continue three miles uphill and at the church, turn right onto Sugarloaf Road, SR 2012. Continue nine miles to Ohiopyle.

From the South (DC, MD, VA): Take I-270 north to Frederick, then I-70 west to Hancock, then Rt. 40 and I-68 through Cumberland. Take Exit 14 (Keysers Ridge) to Rt. 40 west to Farmington, PA. Turn right onto PA 381 north for eight miles to Ohiopyle.

Guidelines For A Safe Outing

OVERVIEW

Camping trips with a troop can be relaxing, enjoyable, and even educational experiences.
But none of this happens without a solid plan.
Make sure you follow these guidelines when planning your next camping trip.

Adult Supervision

At least two adults need to be present during each camping trip, and at least one of those adults needs to be over the age of twenty one. Also, while additional parents may be attending, the two adults previously mentioned should be registered with the Boy Scouts, and have completed Youth Protection training.

Planning

A good plan is the foundation for any successful camping trip. Not only will you want to plan out the trips activities, menu, etc., but you'll also want to have a good plan for your trip in general. Make sure when you leave that people know when you're leaving, where you'll be going, and when you plan on returning. This way, should something happen, people will recognize when you don't return on time, and know where to look for you. Also, make sure you contact the campground or state park you'll be staying in ahead of time to ensure you're aware of any additional rules they have. For example, some campgrounds and state parks do not allow firewood to be brought into the campgrounds, to prevent introducing new species of insects.

Training

While you may not need any specific training for most activities, there are some in which you do. If your troop plans on doing aquatic activities, climbing, shooting, or other activities, you may need to be trained by the Boy Scouts first, to ensure the activity is being run safely.
