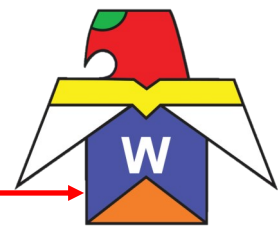

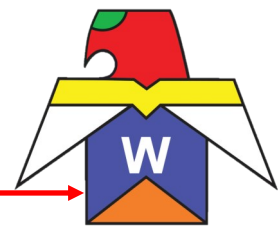

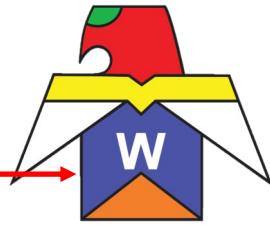

As shown later in this issue, the competition for the best content submission is still running, and I encourage you all to do your part and submit something of value to the T-Bird Times past your immediate duties.

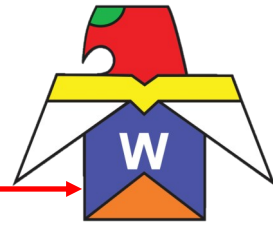

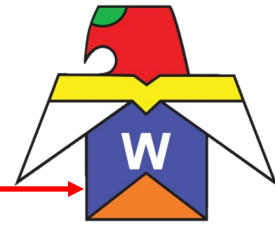

Greetings Wagion,

It is already April, meaning Conclave is fast approaching. For some of you, Conclave is a familiar and found word while, for some, it is a new word with little to no context. Conclave is the gathering of all of the lodges in our section, E12. This includes Kuskitane, Monaken, and Allohak Menewi. The event includes games and activities that act as competitions to help us defeat the other lodges. On the flip side, we come together to elect our section officers. These people represent us on the national stage, and it is important that every lodge has a contingent so they can represent their lodge well in the elections. You can also become one of these officers yourself and represent the section. If you are interested in this, please contact my advisor or me for more information.

This year, we have some special circumstances that will lead to this year's Conclave being one of a lifetime. This year we are having what is colloquially called a "Mega Clave." This year's Conclave will be combined with section E14. Section E14 represents northwestern Pennsylvania. This adds another six lodges for a total of 10 lodges that will be represented at this event. These lodges will be representing western PA, northern West Virginia, western Maryland, and southeast New York.

Also, this event will simultaneously happen with our June Weekend. Now you may ask yourself if it is worth missing the June weekend for this amazing event. But you don't have to miss the June Weekend for Conclave! You will be able to do both events for just the cost of one. Pay your \$25 for the weekend, and the ride to and the food at Conclave will be included.

The way we will be able to do this is through the Conclave Flap Fundraiser. The Conclave Committee is selling two different flaps. The fundraising flap is a black and white version of the delegate flap. The patches are being sold in a 4 to 1 ratio. You must buy four fundraiser patches to buy a delegate flap. If you are interested in buying patches, please contact my advisor Braden Coffman. The sale of the flaps will support the first 15 youth who sign up for conclave.

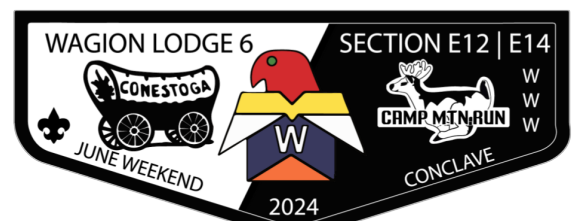

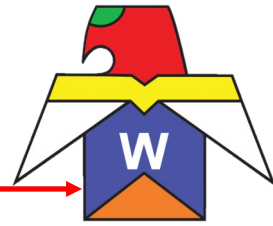

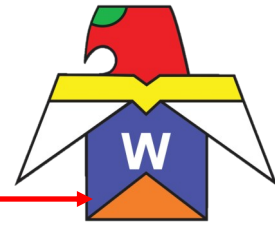

Greetings Wagion!

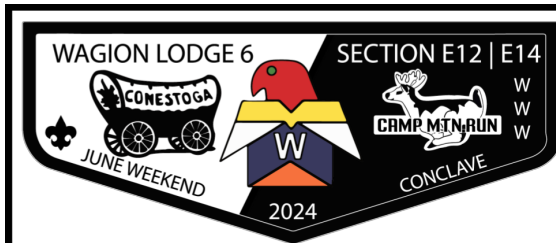
It was great to be with all of you at the banquet, and I really enjoyed speaking to you all at the Vigil forum along with presenting the certificates at our evening show.

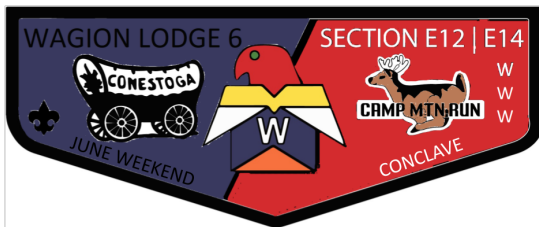

You can Purchase them in a 4:1 ratio, you must buy 4 fundraiser flaps to get one delegate flap. The cost per patch is \$6.

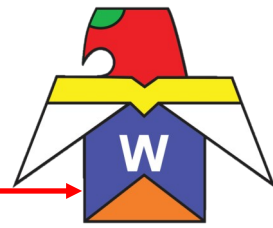

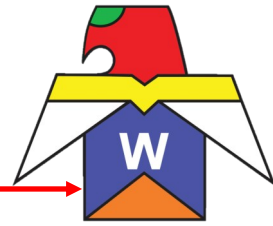

Thunderbird Award Committee

Greetings, Wagion!

At the Annual Fellowship Banquet, we were honored to present the Thunderbird Award to our 2024 recipients: Dan Sosko and Dan Laco! You can read more about them here:

Dan Sosko

Our recipient first joined the Scouting movement in 2010 as a Cub Scout. He later crossed over into Scouts BSA after earning his Arrow of Light in 2015. In 2021, our recipient joined Camp Conestoga staff as a cook, and he served as an Assistant Ranger in 2023. Additionally, he achieved the rank of Eagle Scout after years of exemplary service to his unit and is currently a member of Troop 133.

Our youth recipient was called out in the summer of 2016, and he completed his Ordeal at the 2016 August Fellowship Weekend. He later sealed his membership by completing his Brotherhood the following year. Throughout his time in the lodge, he served as the Commissary Chair, Lodge Treasurer, and 2-term Administrative Vice Chief. In 2020, our recipient was presented with the Vigil Honor, fittingly named "Quischktonhen Mitsuagan" which means "One Who Whispers Recipes." This year he is serving as the Conestoga 75th Anniversary Chair.

Outside of Scouting, our recipient graduated from Southmoreland High School in 2022. He is currently working towards a degree in Electrical Engineering at Penn State's main campus.

Our adult recipient was called out in the summer of 2014, and he later completed his Ordeal at the 2014 October Service Weekend. He sealed his membership by completing his Brotherhood the following year. Throughout his time in the lodge, he has committed himself to developing youth leaders by serving as the Conservation Committee Advisor. In 2018, he was presented with the Vigil Honor, fittingly named "Sehe Nag'atamen Thiechuman Hatton" which means "Quiet Faithful Bathhouse Mechanic."

Beyond the lodge, our recipient has served as a Committee Member, Assistant Scoutmaster, and the Scoutmaster of Troop 465. Furthermore, he joined Camp Conestoga staff in 2019 as an Assistant Ranger. He later returned to the same position in 2021, 2022, and 2023. His eagerness to serve and develop leaders did not end there, as he currently serves as the Laurel Hills Activities Chair and on the District Committee.

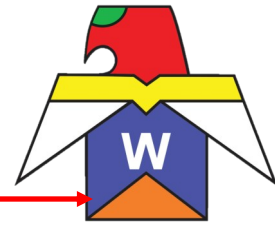
Outside of Scouting, our recipient served in the United States Army from 1985 to 1989. He later worked for Penn United Technologies until his retirement in 2018. Currently, he is a maintenance crew member at McDonald's.

75th Tribute



Happy 75th Anniversary Camp Conestoga!

This year, we're celebrating the 75th Anniversary of Camp Conestoga. But, Scout troops formed in Greensburg, Youngwood and Latrobe in 1911 and in Uniontown and Connellsville in 1916. Westmoreland and Fayette Councils merged in 1939 to form the Council we have today. And, camping has always been part of Scouting. So, where did those Scouts camp? Well, many places, including Ringer's Grove (near where the Yough Dam is today) and Camp Wildwood, near Normalville, which Fayette County Scouts used until 1949. The Scouts from Westmoreland County used Camp Wesco, located on Rt. 130 near Stahlstown, starting in 1934.

So, how did Scouts wind up at Camp Conestoga?

A hundred years ago, the property that we know today as Camp Conestoga was two farms, divided by the road we use to go from the Dining Hall to the Rifle Range. One farmhouse was near the three buildings at the entrance to camp, and the barn was where the flagpole now is. The other farm was across the road. The farmhouse was below where the Dining Hall now stands. Buck Run and areas nearby had been heavily timbered, with most areas clear-cut, leaving a wasteland. In fact, the Hemlock Trail was the only place not timbered.

During the 1930s Great Depression, the federal Government created programs to put people back to work. One was the Recreational Demonstration Area program which built parks. The Government thought that the heavily timbered area could be improved for public use. So, the Government bought the two farms and surrounding property, and the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) turned the land into a park. They built Laurel Hill Dam, over 100 buildings, miles of roads, miles of hiking trails, and made many other improvements. In fact, Laurel Hill has the largest collection of CCC architecture in Pennsylvania.

In 1945, the federal Government gave the Recreational Demonstration Area to Pennsylvania, with the condition that it had to be used as a park or for public recreation. The state turned the property into Laurel Hill State Park.

In 1946, the state started looking for ways to get people to use their new park. At the same time, the council was outgrowing Camps Wesco and Wildwood. So, in 1946, the state allowed the Scouts to camp at Group Camp No. 2 in the new park. Scouts camped there again in 1947. In 1948, the state asked the Scouts to move to Group Camp No. 4 – what we now call Camp Buck Run, which celebrated its 75th Anniversary last year. Camp 4 was very primitive, so only older Scouts were allowed to camp there.

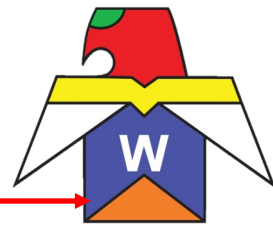
The council liked Laurel Hill, and the state agreed to give the Scouts a lease to Group Camp 4 and Group Camp 6 (which is now Camp Conestoga). The state also built several buildings at both camps in 1949, including the three buildings at the entrance to Camp Conestoga. There was no Dining Hall – Scouts ate in a large Army tent. The council had a contest to name the new camp, and Camp Conestoga was the winner. And that's how, 75 years ago in 1949, the first Scouts camped at Group Camp No. 6, which is what we know today as Camp Conestoga.

40 Years Ago . . .



What Camp Conestoga Was Like 40 Years Ago . . . From an Anonymous Scout

Camp 40 years ago was quite different. For starters, there was no lake at camp. It was just a winding stream that fed into the bigger creek. There were just big, tall cattails where the lake is now. A bridge went over the stream to get to the grove area, and you couldn't see the grove, the pool, or other things from across the water.

Unsurprisingly, the pool hasn't really changed and is the same old basin that it was thanks to all the work put in by our guys to keep it in good shape.

For fish and wildlife, we sat right at the creek and watched the animals right where the lake is now.

The archery range was in the Ordeal circle where the pre-Ordeal ceremony is done. In the woods, there was a walking archery course that you would walk and shoot through.

The canoeing and boating was done in the bigger creek that runs past Scoutcraft. It was dammed up to make it high enough to boat on. There was no sailing or paddle boarding.

If you pass where nature is now, the road will take you into an opening in the woods that's on the bank of the creek. Nature used to be held there, and we would build sweat lodges with bent sticks and would light fires in them near the nature area. It was like building our own saunas!

On Thursday evenings at summer camp, instead of doing cook at your campsite, my troop went on an outpost and hiked towards Buck Run to Hemlock Trail. We took this to the state park and stayed at an Adirondack on a bank of the creek. We used to sneak out at night and go past the dam and went to the lake that was on the state park where there was a beach and nice places to swim.

I didn't know where the OA circle was until I got back into the OA since we had an indoor circle, and my Ordeal was total rain. I helped plant the trees that are on the way into camp right past the entrance sign to Conestoga.

Dad was a provisional Scoutmaster when I was a kid, and so I got to go to three weeks of camp one summer! It was very nice, and I learned a lot.

One night at summer camp, my troop slept on the parade field in a separate tent under staff watch as we went on outpost, and the park rangers accused us of turning over 100 picnic tables. We got driven back to camp by the ranger and were brought to the staff for closer supervision. My dad, acting Scoutmaster, took us all back the next morning to flip them back over and my friend stepped on a rusty nail. The tables were so heavy and I don't think my buddies could've flipped all those tables that night. They sure deny it.

I don't recall Buck Run being used like it is now. My Webelos Weekends and camping trips were at Conestoga.

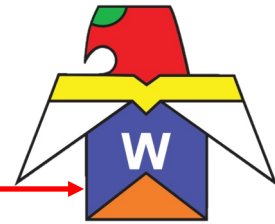
We were in Davy Crockett one summer, and there was a lightning storm in our campsite. It was wicked, and the lightning hit our flagpole, hit the pole of the tent and burnt the pallet anywhere that metal touched it. That was fun.

The bathrooms were all pits that didn't have any plumbing. There was one showerhouse with two shower stalls for the whole camp at the bathroom below the Dining Hall. They were good times. Good luck showering!
